In examining opportunities that work around this impasse, Gavri and Mayor Lucas present a key framework as the city moves forward: building new housing, especially through public-private partnerships that emphasize economic development.

As they explain, new housing developments "generate jobs, attract federal investment, leverage private capital, and produce tangible improvements that politicians across the ideological spectrum can celebrate." They underscore the potential for dual housing-health care system projects following noteworthy success in 2024.
