## Related Experience

- Represented a Latin American country in a UNCITRAL investor-state arbitration under the BIT administered by the PCA. The Tribunal issued its final award, awarding less than five percent of the total amount requested by claimants.
- Represented a Middle Eastern country in international arbitrations that arose out of a failed project to construct a modern railway, where claims of more than \$1 billion in damages were sought against the client. Obtained a discontinuance of the ICSID arbitration and an ICC award in favor of client.
