## Related Experience

- Represented two named plaintiffs in one of the largest civil anti-trust settlements in U.S. jurisprudence.
- Served as co-counsel for a Fortune 500 company in theft of trade secrets claims resulting in a \$20 million jury verdict.
- Defended a poultry company in a case brought by a state attorney general asserting violation of RCRA, CERCLA, common law nuisance, and other environmental claims. The case was tried for 54 trial days over four months resulting in dismissal of all monetary claims on motion.
- Represented a plaintiff in a fraud and products liability case in the U.S. District Court for the Southern District of Indiana involving the design of a grain and forage silo resulting in a plaintiff's verdict of \$2.4 million.
